Dear San Juan County Voter:

San Juan County has 95 elected positions—soon to be 100, if the proposed Orcas Park and Recreation District formation is approved. That means that 1 out of every 110 voters in the county is also an elected official. If you include former elected officials, I suspect that number approaches 1 out of every 25 voters.

That ratio reflects an extraordinary level of community involvement. San Juan County voters like to be involved, and the ballot you will receive in October shows that involvement. The names on the ballot are those of citizens, like you, who are willing to take a hand in the running of the everyday life of the county. 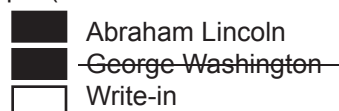

Please use a black or blue ink pen to mark your ballot. To vote for your choice in each contest, completely fill in the box to the left of your choice. To vote for a person not on the ballot, write the name of the candidate in the write-in space provided and fill in the box to the left of the write-in space.

To correct your vote in a contest, draw a line through the incorrectly-voted candidate's entire name. You then have the option of making another choice.

For example (this vote counts for Abraham Lincoln):

**Voting instructions**

1. Mark all races and measures on which you wish to vote.
2. Fold the ballot and place it in the pink security envelope.
3. Place the pink security envelope containing the ballot into the return envelope.
4. Read, sign, and date the Voter's Affidavit on the return envelope.
5. Seal the return envelope.
6. If mailing your voted ballot, place a first class postage stamp on the envelope.
7. If you place your voted ballot in one of our Elections drop-boxes or bring it to the Elections office, no postage is required.

Keep your voter registration up to date!

- *If you have moved from one address to another within San Juan County*, you can either fill out a new voter registration form (mail-in or online at www.vote.wa.gov), which will update all of your information; call the Elections Office at (360) 378-3357 and give your updated information over the phone; or mail or drop off a confirmation letter to our office.
- *If you have moved to San Juan County from another county within Washington State*, you need to fill out a new voter registration form (mail-in or online). Be sure to fill in all the boxes, including the address and county where you were previously registered.
- *If you have moved to San Juan County from another state*, you will need to complete a new voter registration form. We will notify your previous state that you are now registered in Washington.
- *College students*: You can register using either your hometown address or the address where you live now—whichever location you consider yourself a resident. If you choose to use your hometown address, your ballot can be mailed to you at school. Just call or email us to provide your mailing address: elections@sanjuanco.com.

Fireworks in San Juan County

The San Juan County Council adopted Ordinance 28-2008 concerning fireworks and voters have filed a sufficient referendum petition on this Ordinance. The Ordinance prohibits the possession, sale, transfer, and discharge of fireworks without a permit and provides for penalties for violations. Should Ordinance 28-2008 be:

Explanatory Statement

Ordinance 28-2008 has been referred to the voters of the County for their approval through the referendum procedures in the County Charter.

Ordinance 28-2008 bans the possession, offer to sell, use, transfer, and discharge of any fireworks without a permit. The ordinance would repeal existing provisions of the San Juan County Code which authorizes “safe and sane” fireworks (which are defined in the ordinance) from 9 a.m. to midnight on July 4th.

The ordinance retains and does not alter the San Juan County Code provisions which authorize display fireworks for duly authorized public or private displays with a permit.

A person found in violation of the ordinance is guilty of an infraction and subject to a fine of \$250.

A vote to approve Ordinance 28-2008 means that the ordinance will go into effect. A vote to reject Ordinance 28-2008 means that the ordinance will not go into effect and existing laws regarding fireworks will remain in force.

Statement For

Common fireworks are *not* “Safe-and-Sane”! There are still about 8,000 fireworks-related injuries requiring emergency room care or hospitalization each year in the U.S. during the July 4th period. Most fireworks injuries involve devices that are legal under current federal law. The majority of those injured by fireworks are children under age 15. The American Academy of Pediatrics, American Academy of Family Physicians, American Association for Hand Surgery, American Society of Plastic Surgeons, Emergency Nurses Association, International Association of Fire Chiefs, International Association of Firefighters, International Fire Marshals Association, and Prevent Blindness America are all in support of consumer fireworks bans throughout the U.S.

Individual fireworks are *not* cheap entertainment! Millions of dollars in direct property damage is caused each year in less than a 2-week period as Americans celebrate their July 4th Independence. In 2006, there was about \$6 million in damage to schools in Washington State that was caused by fireworks. Firecrackers, bottle rockets and missiles have been illegal throughout the state of Washington for more than 60 years.

Please help us stop a catastrophe before it happens.

Statement Against

Please vote “No” against this overreaching and unnecessary law. What you may not know is that existing state laws already ban the use of pyrotechnic and display fireworks without a permit, yet they are not being fully enforced. Instead of adding more laws, our authorities should enforce the ones they have. The rockets and firecrackers that you may find objectionable are already illegal. In addition, San Juan County restricts your use of personal (safe and sane) fireworks to one day a year. This new measure goes too far. It removes your right to use any personal fireworks, even on the Fourth of July!

Fireworks are the universal language and expression of celebration. This law prohibits you from conducting your own personal and safe celebration of our country’s birth. It gives government total control over your celebration of freedom, requiring a permit to so much as light a pinwheel or sparkler!

While reasonable controls on fireworks are certainly acceptable, particularly in forested and grassland areas, an outright ban is not. This measure is an unreasonable and unwarranted intrusion on our rights and island way of life. Please vote “No”, and send this ordinance back to the County Council drawing board.

Ordinance No. 28 - 2008**AN ORDINANCE BANNING ALL FIREWORKS WITHOUT A PERMIT, AMENDING SAN JUAN COUNTY CODE CHAPTER 9.20 AND PROVIDING FOR PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS**

WHEREAS, the County Council is concerned about public safety and desires to protect the public from injuries and fires resulting from indiscriminate use of fireworks; and

WHEREAS, the County Council finds that this ordinance satisfies the health, safety and public welfare of the people of San Juan County; and

WHEREAS, the County Council conducted a duly advertised public hearing and has received public testimony.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the County Council of San Juan County, State of Washington, as follows:

Section 1. Purpose. The purpose of this ordinance is to amend certain sections of Chapter 9.20 of the County Code to make unlawful the sale, possession or discharge of fireworks without a permit.

Section 2. Definitions. SJCC 9.20.010, Ordinance 14-2000 § 5, and Ordinance 100-1993 (Formerly 15.05.010) are amended to read as follows:

A. "Fireworks" means any composition or device designed to produce a visible or an audible effect by combustion, deflagration or detonation, and which meets the definition of articles pyrotechnic as set forth in RCW 70.77.138, or the definition of consumer fireworks as set forth in RCW 70.77.136, or the definition of display fireworks as set forth in RCW 70.77.131.

A. Lawful Fireworks. Fireworks which may be lawfully discharged by the public from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. on July 4th as defined in Chapter 70.77 RCW. This shall not pertain to duly authorized public or private displays. This includes:

1. "Cylindrical fountain" means cylindrical tubes containing pyrotechnic composition. Upon ignition a shower of colored sparks, and sometimes a whistling effect, is produced. This device may be provided with a spike for insertion into the ground (spike fountain), a wood or plastic base for placing on the ground (base foundation), or a wood or cardboard handle, if intended to be hand held (hand fountain):

2. "Combination items" means firework devices containing combinations of two or more of the effects in this section:

3. "Cone fountain" means a cardboard or heavy paper cone containing pyrotechnic composition. The effect is the same as that of a cylindrical fountain:

4. "Flitter sparklers" means a narrow paper tube filled with pyrotechnic composition that produces smoke and sparks upon ignition. The paper at one end of the tube is ignited to make the device function:

5. "Ground spinner" means a small device similar to a wheel in design and effect and placed on the ground and ignited. A shower of sparks and color is produced by the rapidly spinning device:

6. "Helicopter, aerial spinner" means a tube containing pyrotechnic composition. A propeller or blade is attached, which upon ignition lifts the rapidly spinning device into the air. A visible or audible effect is produced at the height of flight:

7. "Illuminating torch" means a cylindrical tube containing pyrotechnic composition. Upon ignition colored fire is produced. May be spike, base or hand held:

8. "Mine, shell" means a heavy cardboard or paper tube attached to a wood or plastic base and containing pyrotechnic composition. Upon ignition, "stars," firecrackers, or other devices are propelled into the air. The tube remains on the ground:

9. "Roman candle" means a heavy paper or cardboard tube attached to a wood or plastic base and containing pyrotechnic composition. Upon ignition, up to 40 "stars" (pellets of pressed pyrotechnic composition that burn with bright color) are individually expelled at several-second intervals:

10. "Smoke device" means a tube or sphere containing pyrotechnic composition that upon ignition produces white or colored smoke as the primary effect:

11. "Sparkler" means a stick or wire coated with pyrotechnic composition that produces a shower of sparks:

upon ignition:

12. "Wheel" means a pyrotechnic device attached to a post or tree by means of a nail or string. Each wheel may contain up to six "driver" units containing pyrotechnic composition:

B. Unlawful Fireworks. Fireworks which are unlawful to possess, transport or discharge at any time in San Juan County and defined in Chapter 70.77 RCW. This shall not pertain to duly authorized public or private displays. This includes:

1. "Chaser" means a small paper or cardboard tube that travels along the ground upon ignition. A whistling effect, or other noise, is often produced:

2. "Firecracker, salutes" means a small paper-wrapped or cardboard tube containing pyrotechnic composition. Upon ignition, noise and a flash of light is produced:

3. "Missile-type rocket" means a device similar to a sky rocket in size, composition and effect that uses fins rather than a stick for guidance and stability:

4. "Sky rocket" means tubes that may contain pyrotechnic composition. Sky rockets contain a wood stick for guidance and stability and rise into the air upon ignition. A burst of color or noise, or both, is produced at the height of flight:

B. G. "Public display" means an entertainment feature where the public is invited, admitted or permitted to view the display or discharge of display special fireworks.

Ordinance 28-2008 continued.

C. ~~Ø.~~ “Special effects,” pursuant to RCW 70.77.146, means any combination of chemical elements or chemical compounds capable of burning independently of the oxygen in the atmosphere, and designed and intended to produce an audible, visual, mechanical or thermal effect as an integral a necessary part of a motion picture, radio, television production, theatrical or opera production, or live entertainment.

D. “Display fireworks” means large fireworks designed primarily for display and classified as such by the U.S. Department of Transportation, as further set forth in RCW 70.77.131.

E. “Extreme fire danger” means a period of hot, dry weather accompanied by low fuel moistures. It is during this period that wildland fires can be expected and fire growth will be accelerated.

Section 3. Possession, sale, transfer and discharge of fireworks unlawful without a permit. SJCC 9.20.030, Ordinance 14-2000 § 5, and Ordinance 100-1993 (Formerly 15.05.030) are amended to read as follows:

It is unlawful for any person to possess, sell, offer to sell, use, transfer, discharge or explode any fireworks, ~~other than those defined in SJCC 9.20.010(A)(1) through (12);~~ within the unincorporated areas of San Juan County, except for ~~–This section shall not pertain to~~ duly authorized public or private displays for which a permit has been issued under this chapter.

Section 4. Applicability. SJCC 9.20.090, Ordinance 14-2000 § 5, and Ordinance 100-1993 (Formerly 15.05.090) are amended to read as follows:

The provisions of this chapter shall be applicable to the sales and use of all fireworks except toy paper caps containing not more than twenty-five hundredths grain of explosive compound for each cap and trick or novelty devices not classified as consumer common fireworks.

Section 5. Repealer. The following sections of the San Juan County Code and the implementing ordinances are hereby repealed:

Section 9.20.020 of the San Juan County Code, which codified Ordinance 14-2000 § 5, and Ordinance 100-1993 (Formerly SJCC 15.05.020).

Section 6. Penalty for Violations. The penalty provisions of SJCC 9.20.120 shall apply to violations of this ordinance. Pursuant to SJCC 9.20.120 any person violating or failing to comply with any provisions of this chapter is guilty of an infraction and subject to a fine of up to \$250.00.

Section 7. Effective Date. In accordance with RCW 70.77.250(4), this Ordinance shall be effective one year after adoption.

Section 8. Codification. Sections 2 through 5 shall be codified.

County of San Juan Levy Proposition No. 1

concerning an increase to the property tax levy.

The San Juan County Council adopted Resolution No. 28-2009 concerning an increase to the property tax levy. This proposition would increase the regular property tax levy of San Juan County by \$0.12 to a total of \$0.60336 per \$1000 of assessed valuation for tax years 2010-2015 and subject to the limit factors in RCW Chapter 84.55, for the purpose of funding programs and personnel for: senior services, fair, parks, extension programs, public health, sheriff, prosecutor and other items at the amounts set forth in the resolution. Should this proposition be:

- Approved
- Rejected

Explanatory Statement

The San Juan County Council has proposed to increase property taxes by 12 cents per \$1000 assessed value to a total of 60.336 cents per \$1000 of assessed value for a period of six years beginning in the year 2010 and ending in 2015.

The increase is expected to generate about \$960,000 in the year 2010 and future increases are subject to the limit factor set out in RCW Chapter 84.55.

The resolution adopted by the County Council sets out specifically the amount allocated to eleven funds, programs or positions that are to be paid from the proceeds of this levy and any proportionate increases to the levy. The funds raised by this levy are dedicated in the resolution and to be used only for these purposes specified unless the change in use is approved by the voters.

The programs and amount for the year 2010 are listed as follows:

- A. Senior Services on San Juan, Orcas, and Lopez Islands, at a cost of approximately \$211,000;
- B. WSU Extension programs, including 4-H, Master Gardeners, and other volunteer and agricultural programs at a cost of approximately \$129,000;
- C. Maintenance and operation of County parks, at a cost of approximately \$200,000;

- D. General fund support of the San Juan County Fair, at a cost of approximately \$5,000;
- E. Immunization clinics and public health services on San Juan, Orcas, and Lopez Islands, at a cost of approximately \$112,000;
- F. A Sheriff's Department correctional officer restored to a full-time position, at a cost of approximately \$42,000;
- G. A deputy prosecuting attorney restored to a full-time position at a cost of approximately \$45,000;
- H. The Department of Emergency Management manager funded out of the general fund, at a cost of approximately \$50,000;
- I. Reducing the number of days the County is closed for business at a cost of approximately \$140,000;
- J. Maintenance of County buildings and grounds at a cost of approximately \$18,000;
- K. Protection of island waters by funding the maintenance of Islands' Oil Spill Association emergency response equipment at a cost of \$8,000.

What kind of county do you want?

Since 2002, Initiative 747 has limited the growth in property taxes to 1%, plus the amount generated by new construction. Property tax growth is not keeping up with the increase in costs and population. Many services that county residents value—including senior services, immunization clinics and other public health services, 4-H, county parks, emergency management, oil spill protection, and more—are likely to be reduced or eliminated.

Why cut these programs, rather than others? Simply put, they are not required. The County has already reduced its general fund budget by over one million dollars. Many required programs have already been reduced to the point where they cannot be cut any more.

concerning renewal of and increase to the District's regular property tax levy.

The Board of Commissioners of the San Juan Island Park and Recreation District ("Island Rec") adopted Resolution No. 09-05 concerning renewal of and increase to the District's regular property tax levy. This proposition would authorize Island Rec to impose annual property tax levies of \$0.17 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation for the tax years 2010–2015, and subject to the limit factors in RCW 84.55, of which \$0.10 or a proportionate amount will be dedicated to continue funding programs, parks, and services, and \$0.07 or a proportionate amount will be dedicated to support athletic and recreational programs with the San Juan Island School District. Should this proposition be:

- Approved
- Rejected

Explanatory Statement

The San Juan Island Park and Recreation District ("Island Rec") must renew its property tax levy every six years. This proposal affects the district levy for the years 2010 through 2015.

This proposal is for a single-levy increase to a total of 17 cents per \$1000 of assessed valuation. That levy amount is expected to generate approximately \$574,859 in 2010, and future increases are subject to the limit factor in RCW Chapter 84.55.

Island Rec has specified two purposes for the revenue. Of the 17 cents, 10 cents per \$1000 assessed value (an amount anticipated to be \$338,152 in 2010) will be used to continue funding the programs and parks and recreational services by Island Rec as determined by the Board of Island Rec.

Of the 17 cents, 7 cents per \$1000 assessed value (an amount anticipated to be \$236,707 in 2010) will be used to make payments pursuant to an intergovernmental agreement with San Juan Island School District to provide interscholastic sports programs.

Explanatory Statement

A petition was submitted to the County Council requesting that the voters consider a proposition to establish the Orcas Island Park and Recreation District. The district boundaries are all of Orcas Island.

If approved by a majority of those voting, this measure will establish a park and recreation district with authority to conduct leisure time activities and provide facilities and recreational facilities of a nonprofit nature as a public service to the residents of Orcas Island.

The district will be governed by five park and recreation district commissioners who must reside in the district and who will also be on the ballot. Those positions will be established with the persons duly elected if the park and recreation district is approved.

This is a petition for formation of the park and recreation district only. The petition initiating the formation of the district did not include a provision for financing the district, so that will occur at a later date based upon action by the commissioners elected to the district. If a tax is proposed, it will be subject to voter approval.

A “yes” vote is in favor of the formation of a park and recreation district. A “no” vote is against the formation of a park and recreation district.

Statement For

By voting “Yes”, Orcas Islanders will be approving the creation of an Orcas Island Park and Recreation district.

This initiative is widely supported by the citizens of Orcas Island as demonstrated by the 650 signatures acquired in three weeks. It was created by interested citizens in Orcas Recreation, the Orcas Island School District and the Funhouse. While we are all concerned with the health and safety of our island kids, our commitment is to create a vibrant recreational district for *all* islanders.

Current parks and recreation infrastructures are financially unstable and struggle to remain functional. Establishing a Park and Recreation district for Orcas Island will facilitate a sustainable system while placing control in the hands of Orcas Islanders. Through this district, we might be able to maintain some of our most defining assets such as the Village Green.

Voters will be able to select five commissioners who, with the assistance of the community, will develop a strategic plan, supporting budget, and govern the new Orcas Island Park and Recreation district.

There are no new taxes associated with this initiative at this time. Any potential taxes associated with this district will be put to a public vote in 2010 or later.
