I am pleased to present the 2025 General Election Voters' Pamphlet on behalf of the Office of the Secretary of State. This comprehensive guide to the candidates and measures on your ballot can help you find the information you need to cast your vote.

Elections that are accessible, secure, and transparent are the cornerstone of our democracy, providing you with the opportunity to make your voice heard on a variety of issues. This general election, you have the chance to help decide who represents your local community and weigh in on measures that affect daily life in Washington. It all starts with making sure you're registered to vote. Online and mail-in voter registrations and updates must be received by Monday, Oct. 27. In-person registration is also available at your local county elections office until 8 p.m. on Election Day, Nov. 4. If you're already registered to vote, now is a great time to sign into VoteWA and verify your voter registration information is up to date.

Once you receive and vote your ballot, make sure you sign the return envelope. Highly trained elections officials compare your signature to the one on your voter registration before your ballot can be counted. Then, return your ballot. If you vote by U.S. mail — no stamp needed — remember that ballots must be postmarked by Election Day to be counted. The USPS recommends mailing a week before Election Day to ensure your ballot is received on time. Or, return your ballot to one of the many secure ballot drop boxes across the state by 8 p.m. on Election Day. You can track the status of your ballot at VoteWA.gov after returning it. Sign up for text notifications so you'll know when your ballot is received and accepted.

Exercising your right to vote is one of the most powerful ways you can make a difference in your community. Thank you for voting and supporting democracy here in Washington.

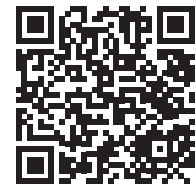

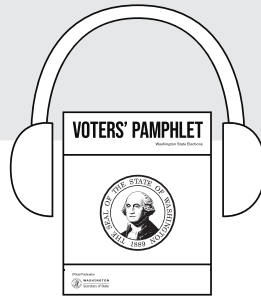

Qualifications

To vote, you must be at least 18 years old, a U.S. citizen, a resident of Washington, and not currently serving a sentence of total confinement in prison for a felony.



What if I'm not 18 yet?

If you are 16 or 17, become a Future Voter!

Sign up with your Washington state driver's license, permit, ID, or the last four digits of your Social Security number. You'll be automatically registered to vote when you qualify.

Future Voter

Past felony conviction?

Get registered to vote.

Washington now restores voting rights to citizens with felony convictions immediately upon release from prison.

You must **re-register** to vote to receive a ballot.



Moved? Update your voting address

Contact a county elections office to request a ballot at your new address.

By October 27: Have your application received by mail or updated online.

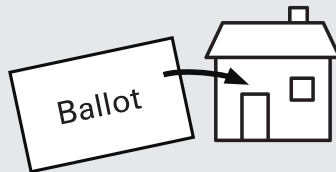

How do I vote and return my ballot?

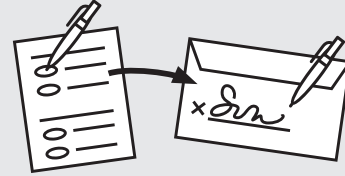

If you're registered to vote, there is no need to request a ballot. Your ballot will be mailed by **October 17** to the address you provided on your voter registration. If you need a replacement ballot, contact a county elections office listed at the end of this pamphlet.



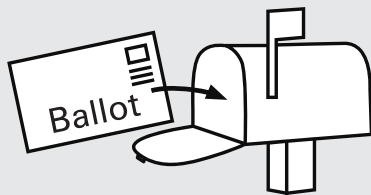

Vote your ballot and sign your return envelope. We need your signature to accept your ballot. You are not required to vote every race on your ballot. We encourage using this pamphlet to help you decide.



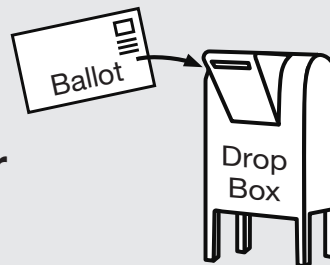

Return your ballot by mail, no stamp needed. If mailed, your ballot must be postmarked by **November 4**. Don't let a late postmark disqualify your ballot. The USPS recommends that you mail a week before Election Day.



Or, return your ballot to an official ballot drop box. Drop boxes are open until 8 p.m. on **November 4**. Find drop box locations at **VoteWA.gov**.

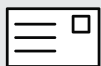

If you cannot personally return your ballot, only let people you trust deliver it for you.

Check the status of your ballot on **VoteWA.gov** to see if it has been received by your county elections office.



Election staff will contact you before your ballot is processed if:

- Your signature is missing
- Your signature doesn't match your voter registration record

After 8 p.m. on election night, tallied results from each county are posted at **results.vote.wa.gov**.

Results are updated as counties report and are unofficial until certification.

Senate Joint Resolution No.

This amendment would allow the state fund dedicated to providing long-term care benefits for eligible seniors and people with disabilities to be invested as authorized by law.

Explanatory Statement

The Law As It Presently Exists

The Washington Constitution generally prohibits investing public money in stocks of private companies. This means that state funds can only be invested in fixed-income securities, such as government and corporate bonds and certificates of deposit.

The Constitution currently exempts several funds from this restriction. This exemption applies to any public pension or retirement fund, workers' compensation funds, and money held in trust for the benefit of people with developmental disabilities, permitting those funds to be invested as authorized by law, including in stocks of private companies. The Washington State Investment Board invests and manages these funds.

In 2019, the legislature created a long-term care insurance program. The program provides money to pay for certain long-term care services, such as nursing home care, to program beneficiaries who need assistance with daily living. Under that law, employees pay premiums for long-term care insurance through a payroll deduction, and those premiums are deposited into a Long-Term Services and Supports Trust Account. Under the current provision of the Constitution, money held in the Trust Account cannot be invested in stocks of private companies.

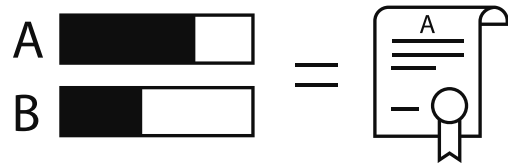
The Effect of the Proposed Amendment if Approved

This Amendment would allow funds in the Long-Term Services and Supports Trust Account to be invested in stocks of private companies, if authorized by law. Investment income from the Trust Account could only be used for long-term care services and supports for program beneficiaries, including for seniors and people with disabilities.

Argument for

Approve 8201 to guarantee long-term care funds are there when we need them

8201 requires 100% of investment income earned by the state's Long-Term Care Trust Fund to be spent on long-term care services for vulnerable seniors and disabled people. Washingtonians want to live with dignity as they age. 8201 supports this shared goal, strengthening the benefit's Trust Fund to help seniors and disabled Washingtonians while protecting taxpayers.

8201 is a commonsense measure that ensures tax dollars go further

Current law limits investment of the Trust Fund to only low-return choices, like government bonds and savings certificates. 8201 allows the Trust Fund to be invested to produce higher returns. This proven method would be managed by the independent, nonpartisan Washington State Investment Board, which is bound by the highest fiduciary standards.

Approve 8201 to increase funding without impacting taxpayers

8201 is projected to grow the Trust Fund by \$67 billion over the next 50 years, money that can be used to increase benefits for people with disabilities and seniors without costing taxpayers a penny. Higher earnings mean more money for care – good for seniors, disabled Washingtonians, their families, and taxpayers!

8201 has overwhelming bipartisan support across the political spectrum

It's encouraging when leaders of both parties agree on something – and a supermajority of Democratic and Republican lawmakers approved this commonsense approach. 8201 is supported by nurses, unions, businesses, and groups representing millions of Washingtonian seniors and people with pre-existing conditions. *Vote Approve!*

Rebuttal of argument against

Fact: Since 1981 the independent Washington State Investment Board has *safely and effectively* managed over \$200 billion for pensions, college savings funds, and more, with an average growth rate of 8% yearly. We must ensure our Long-Term Care Trust Fund grows to *keep up with rising costs while protecting taxpayers*. A bipartisan supermajority of lawmakers approved this measure. *Approve 8201* so WA's Trust Fund is *there for aging seniors and people with disabilities*.

Argument against

Reject this constitutional change, *again*.

Washington voters already rejected this proposal to take taxpayer money and invest in private stocks and corporations (2020, SJR8212). Our state founders protected public funds from risky investments by establishing safeguards in our state Constitution prohibiting corporate stock market investments of your tax dollars.

Reject constitutional changes that gamble your money in an unstable market.

SJR 8201 overturns safeguards for the Long Term Services and Support (LTSS) fund, a multibillion dollar program established in 2020. Washingtonians are not yet eligible to access program benefits but proponents are *again* asking you to remove a key Constitutional protection. Currently, it's safeguarded in *secured* investments like federal, state and municipal bonds, which support our communities -- *a better use of our tax dollars*. Stock markets and private investments fluctuate greatly, *with no guarantees*, and the benefit needs are unknown in this untested program. This LTSS fund exists to help Washingtonians access long term care as we age or face disability. *When market speculation falls short, taxpayers and beneficiaries would pay the price through reduced benefits or increased taxes*.

Rejecting constitutional changes provide more stability and certainty.

Continuing to invest our public money into federal, state and municipal bonds supports public works that we all depend on. Rejecting SJR 8201 provides for better planning and stability.

Reject SJR 8201

Our state and LTSS need fiscal responsibility, not financial roulette. Reject SJR 8201 to keep the fund secure, stable, and focused on serving the people who will depend on it.

Rebuttal of argument for

Proponents imply a guaranteed return of \$\$billions over 50 years but of course, that's not guaranteed. In 2008 the State Investment Board lost -26.2% and 2022 lost -12.9%. It's how the stock market works. In future recessions or market crashes, when returns fall short, benefits must be cut or tax rates must go up. Compared to *guaranteed* municipal bond returns of 3-5%, the choice is clear. Invest in ourselves, not Wall Street. *Reject SJR 8201*.

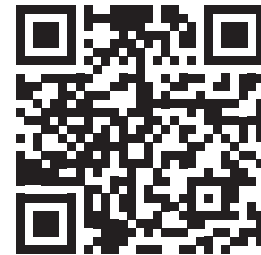

How to vote

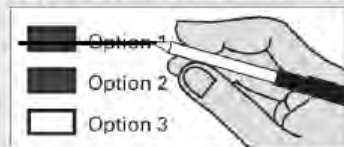


Use a dark blue or black ink pen to completely fill in the box to the left of your choice.

Do not use pencil.

Vote for one in each race/measure. If you vote for more than one, no votes will be counted for that race/measure.

If you make a mistake



Draw a line through the entire race/measure response. Then you may make another choice.

Do not use white-out.

Optional write-in



To vote for a candidate not listed, print the name on the blank line provided above 'Write-in' and fill in the box.

- o Tear off the stub at the top of the ballot and throw the stub away.
- o Mark all contests you wish to vote. You don't have to vote every issue.
- o Put your finished ballot into the security sleeve.
- o Put your security sleeve and ballot into the return envelope.
- o Read, sign, and date the Voter's Declaration on the envelope. We cannot count your ballot unless you sign the declaration.
- o Seal the return envelope.
- o Return your voted ballot.

Proposition No. 1 - Capital Projects Levy for Sitework and Safety Improvements

The Board of Directors of Orcas Island School District No. 137 adopted Resolution No. 2025-04, concerning a proposition to fund specific site and safety improvements. This proposition would authorize the District to levy the following excess taxes, on all taxable property within the District, to improve OISD campus site and safety (reconfiguring, expanding and paving driveways, parking areas and walkways; installing LED lighting; adding shotput/discus competition area):

This measure would authorize a regular property tax levy of \$0.71 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation, and the resulting levy dollar amount would thereafter be used for the purpose of computing the limitations of subsequent levies under RCW 84.55.50.

Explanatory Statement

Written by Matt T. Paxton, CSD Attorneys at Law, P.S.

San Juan County Public Hospital District No. 1 (the "District") put forth this ballot measure to authorize an increase of its regular property tax levy to \$0.71 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation in 2025 (for collection in 2026), compared to \$0.51 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation being collected this year, which would be used to establish the base amount for calculating 1% increases in the future.

This levy is the primary funding source for medical services provided by the District, including emergency medical services, a long-term care facility, and at-home care services, as well as financially supporting clinic and hospital services at PeaceHealth Peace Island Medical Center and other local providers. In the absence of voter approval, the District may only increase its annual revenue by 1% over the prior year, which does not keep pace with the rising cost of providing medical services.

Approval of this proposition would allow the District to maintain the level of services it provides. Rejection of this proposition will impact the District's ability to continue the level of services.

Argument For

We need to preserve local healthcare for islanders. Extreme cuts to federal healthcare funds will take effect next year. The state is facing a significant budget deficit and has also made cuts. On top of that, under the terms of the contract, the Public Hospital District's (PHD) subsidy for the Peace Island Hospital increases every year. That increase comes straight out of the PHD's budget. We know that real financial problems are coming, and we must be realistic and ready to manage them.

Healthcare is struggling everywhere, and our isolated island community is no exception. For example, the San Juan Island EMS community paramedicine program fills gaps in care by helping islanders in their homes with fall prevention, medication management, and wound care. The program desperately needs more funding. The PHD loses money on low-income islanders who rely on Medicaid. Without additional funding the PHD will struggle to serve these folks, our neighbors, including at The Village.

Our population is the second oldest of Washington's 39 counties. Good healthcare is important for all of us, but it's particularly true given our median age. Quality care for islanders requires healthcare workers who live here. Those workers need stable housing. This levy lid lift will help the PHD address that critical healthcare problem, in collaboration with other local agencies.

We're increasingly on our own when it comes to healthcare. This levy lid lift will benefit our entire island community. We urge you to VOTE YES.

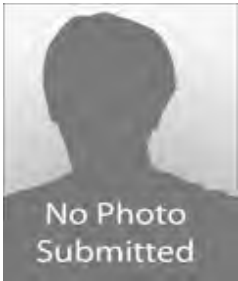

Passage of Proposition 1 would allow Orcas Island School District to fund specific capital improvements with a six-year levy to address aging and deteriorating infrastructure, improve student and staff safety and expand student athletic opportunities.

Specifically, Proposition 1 will allow the District to improve the OISD campus grounds (not buildings) by: (1) reconfiguring, expanding and paving driveways, parking areas and walkways and making related infrastructure improvements; (2) installing LED site lighting; (3) adding a shotput and discus competition area (providing the final necessary facilities required to start hosting track meets); and (4) making other site and safety improvements at the OISD campus.

The driveway and parking improvements were alternate projects in the past two bond measures that ultimately were not selected. As a result, these areas have continued to deteriorate. Proposition 1 will allow the District to improve student, staff, pedestrian, and traffic safety within the OISD campus grounds by constructing these specific site improvements.

The proposed levy would authorize collection of taxes to provide up to \$1,052,000 in each of the years 2026 through 2031. The levy rate per \$1,000 of assessed value required to produce these amounts is estimated to be \$0.1987 in 2026, \$0.1929 in 2027, \$0.1873 in 2028, \$0.1818 in 2029, \$0.1765 in 2030 and \$0.1714 in 2031. The exact levy rates will be adjusted based upon the actual assessed value of property within the District at the time of the levy.

Proposition 2 will fund a portion of the District's educational programs and operations not funded or fully funded by the State of Washington. These include essential faculty and staff, school supplies, mental health, music, athletics, farm to classroom and maintenance.

The proposed levy would authorize collection of taxes to provide up to \$750,000 in each of the years 2026 through 2028, which is approximately 2.4% of the District's General Fund budget. The levy rate per \$1,000 of assessed value required to produce these amounts is estimated to be \$0.1390 in 2026, \$0.1349 in 2027 and \$0.1310 in 2028. The exact levy rates will be adjusted based upon the actual assessed value of property within the District at the time of the levy.

In Washington State, an educational programs and operations (EP&O) levy is a local property tax used to fund costs of school districts' general operations not met by state or federal funding. Since 1979, the Washington Legislature has imposed a levy limit to cap the amount that may be raised by EP&O levies. When the Legislature increases the levy limit, voters must approve a levy in order to provide funding up to the new limit.

Orcas Island voters last approved the District's EP&O levy in 2024 for collection in years 2025 through 2028. During the 2025 legislative session, the Legislature passed Engrossed Substitute House Bill 2049, which increases the EP&O levy limit by an "inflation" adjustment to pay ongoing costs of educational programs and operations.

As a result of this legislative change, passage of Proposition 2 would allow the District to collect a three-year educational programs and operations levy to make up the difference between the existing EP&O levy and the new levy limit the Legislature approved in 2025. This funding is necessary to maintain current educational programming.

The Educational Programs and Operations (EP&O) Levy before you represents a small increase of approximately \$0.139 per \$1,000 of your assessed property value (or less than \$100 per year for a property valued at \$700,000). Voter-supported funding pays for programs and personnel not covered by the Washington state budget, and the EP&O Levies account for nearly 20% of the necessary resources needed to operate and maintain the Orcas Island Public School District's programs and operations. Recent legislation was enacted to allow for this small increase.

This proposition authorizes Orcas Island Fire & Rescue to issue one or more series of general obligation bonds maturing within 20 years in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$18,500,000 to refurbish and purchase fire engines, tenders, ambulances, and trucks and to improve fire stations and facilities to support firefighting capacity, prevention, protection and emergency medical services; and to levy annual excess property taxes to repay the bonds, as provided in Resolution No. 2025-02.

Many Orcas Island Fire & Rescue apparatus are at the end of their useful lives, and certain facilities need repair or improvement. Proposition 1 allows Orcas Island Fire & Rescue to issue bonds to refurbish and purchase ambulances, fire engines, tenders, light trucks and brush trucks, to rehabilitate and improve roofs, cranes/lifts, utilities, restrooms and other fire station facilities, and for other qualifying capital improvements. Bond proceeds will be used for these improvements and upgrades to support firefighting capacity, prevention, protection and emergency medical services, including wildfire defense.

Proposition 1 would authorize the issuance of up to \$18,500,000 of general obligation bonds in one or more issuances to be repaid over 20 years and the levy of annual property taxes to repay the bonds.

Our current estimate of the bond levy rate is approximately \$0.27 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation, assuming the bonds are issued in two series, which is about \$267 per year, or \$22 a month, for a \$1,000,000 residential property.

Argument For

Orcas Island Fire & Rescue responds to multiple emergency calls daily – often two or more ambulance calls at once. Their ability to provide lifesaving care and fire protection depends on reliable vehicles and safe, functional stations.

During the recent Westsound Wildland fire, crews handled EMS calls and fire suppression simultaneously. All patients received care, and every home was saved. That outcome was only possible because the district had enough working equipment and trained personnel essential to community safety and the fire department’s ability to protect lives and property.

Many engines, medic units, rescue vehicles, and brush trucks are beyond their service life. Station infrastructure – including roofs, restrooms, HVAC, and utilities – requires urgent repair to remain safe for responders and the public.

Proposition 1 authorizes up to \$18.5 million in general obligations bonds, issued in one or more series and repaid over 20 years. Funds will replace aging apparatus, rehabilitate fire stations, and strengthen infrastructure for emergency medical response, fire protection, and wildfire defense.

The estimated cost is about 27 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value – roughly \$267 per year, or \$22 per month, for a \$1,000,000 property. These funds are local and are restricted to capital improvements outlined in the measure. No surprises. No diversion.

Proposition No. 1 – Establishing Regular Property Tax Levy Rate

The Board of Trustees of the Orcas Island Library District adopted Resolution No. 02-2025 concerning partial restoration of the Library District’s regular property tax levy. This proposition would restore the District’s regular property tax levy to \$0.42 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation in 2025 (for collection in 2026). The maximum allowable levy in 2025, collected in 2026, shall serve as the base for subsequent levy limitations as provided by Chapter 84.55 RCW.

Orcas Island Library District serves all who live, work, go to school, or own property on Orcas Island. The District offers thousands of books, DVDs, and digital resources, along with internet access, public meeting space, programs and book clubs for all ages, and community partnerships that bring services island-wide. In 2024, the library hosted 107,760 patron visits, delivered 417 programs with 11,916 attendees and circulated 82,712 items.

Voters last approved a levy lid lift of \$0.45 per \$1,000 of assessed value in 2016. Since then, operating costs have increased and the number of patrons served has increased. However, Washington law limits the amount the District can collect from taxes to an increase of 1% per year, even when property values rise at a higher rate. As a result, the levy rate for the District in 2024 (collected in 2025) is \$0.215 per \$1,000 of assessed value.

The District seeks voter approval to partially restore its regular levy to \$0.42 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation in 2025 (for collection in 2026), which would result in a property tax increase of approximately \$0.205 per \$1,000 of assessed value – roughly \$143.50 for a \$700,000 home. If approved, the levy would be used to establish the base amount for calculating 1% increases in the future.

This levy is the primary source of funding for services provided by the District. Voter approval of Proposition No. 1 will provide funding for current levels of library services and maintenance, including the preservation of opening hours, staffing, programs and collections.

In the absence of voter approval, the District may only increase its annual revenue by 101% over the prior year. Rejection of this proposition will impact the District’s ability to continue the level of services and attend to the ongoing critical physical maintenance of the library building.

Argument For

The Orcas Island Public Library is a jewel within this jewel of the San Juan Islands. Your Library provides vital services for the entire Orcas Island community. In addition to a robust book collection, the Library provides an array of digital services and resources, programming for adults, teens, and children, public meeting spaces, and public internet access. This past year your Library hosted over 107,000 visits, and did so by effectively managing our budget and relying on generous volunteers and donors to keep the library open 7 days a week. As a result, the Library has not required a levy lid lift since 2016.

The library depends on funding through a property tax levy to operate. Federal funding to libraries has been severely cut this year, and state funding is limited. This means fewer dollars for services that the library provides, such as eBooks and digital resources. Your vote to approve this measure will restore Library funding to levels that will allow us to maintain our current level of service and staffing through 2035. Restoring Library funding levels also ensures that the Library can provide critical maintenance to protect Orcas Island's investment in our beautiful building.

Now, more than ever, libraries play a critical role in providing all citizens with access to information. Voting for this measure will allow the Library to continue to serve as a central community resource for Orcas Island for the next decade. Please vote "Approve"!

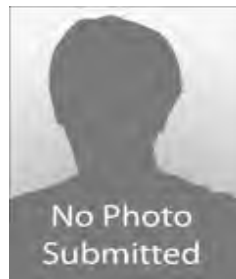

A petition was submitted to the County Council requesting that the voters consider a proposition to establish the Lopez Island Parks and Recreation District and that the initial capital or operational costs for the District be financed by regular property tax levies for a six-year period as authorized by RCW 36.69.145.

If approved by a majority of those voting, this measure will impose a regular property tax levy in the amount of 37 cents per thousand dollars assessed valuation for a period of six years beginning in 2026.

These funds will be used for capital or operational costs of a park and recreation district with authority to conduct leisure time activities and provide facilities and recreational facilities of a nonprofit nature as a public service to the residents of Lopez Island.

This is a measure for the financing of the park and recreation district only. There is a separate ballot measure regarding the formation of the district. This measure will only take effect if the measure to form the Lopez Park and Recreation District is approved.

A "yes" vote is in favor of the levy to finance the park and recreation district. A "no" vote is against the levy to finance the park and recreation district.

Argument For

Let's invest in a solution — for youth, families, and islanders of all ages.

Fund Immediate Needs Due to the school funding crisis and the imminent disappearance of federal grants, school sports, afterschool care, and summer workshops are at risk. Vote YES to approve the levy and support our working families and youth.

A state law change (the McCleary decision) blocked Lopez from collecting local school funds that voters had already approved. This levy helps restore that lost, voter-supported funding — and puts control back in local hands.

Now is not the time to create a new taxing district with a levy rate of \$0.37 per \$1,000 assessed value for "leisure" activities while our public school and clinic struggle to provide essential services amidst budget cuts. This proposed tax will add another \$315 annually for a median-priced home (\$850,000).

This proposed levy will drive up our already high cost of living. We need our tax dollars to support essential Lopez institutions such as the library, school, fire district, and solid waste. Working families and households on fixed-incomes are already being priced out.

According to the Rally for Lopez Rec Committee's proposed budget (<https://rallyfortherec.org/wp-content/uploads/2025/02/Rally-for-the-Rec-Community-presentation.pptx-1-1.pdf>), only 21% of the proposed revenue will benefit the school's athletic program which includes \$140K for existing school programs plus \$40K, most of which is for a new swimming program. Meanwhile \$337,000 per year is proposed to go towards administration & operations: a director and assistant, insurance, IT, legal, and accounting. This is excessive overhead.

The proposed levy rate is designed to be locked in for six years, with no ability to lower the amount collected should circumstances change. Other districts in the state use "up to" language for flexibility. Orcas and San Juan Parks & Rec collect \$0.10 and \$0.28 respectively per \$1,000 assessed value, well below the \$0.37 rate proposed for Lopez.

Lopez must prioritize affordability and essential services over creating a costly, permanent bureaucracy for leisure programs.

Vote NO on this proposed levy.

Explanatory Statement

Each year, the Governing Board of the Lopez Solid Waste Disposal District has proposed a balanced budget that includes revenue from tipping fees based upon weight or volume, and tax revenue to be paid for with a one-year property tax levy. For the year 2026, the amount of the tax revenue that is budgeted is \$210,000.

The Governing Board has adopted Resolution No. 2025-02 calling for an election to approve the one-year property tax measure to generate \$210,000. If adopted, the property tax rate for the Solid Waste District would be an amount of approximately \$0.094 per \$1,000 of assessed value for taxes imposed for the year 2026. The Lopez Solid Waste Disposal District must use the revenue raised for district operations and capital expenses. A "yes" vote is a vote to approve the proposal; a "no" vote is a vote against the proposal. A sixty percent majority is needed to pass this measure.

Argument For

To sustain current services, including our free recycling programs and Take It Or Leave It (TIOLI), Lopez Solid Waste Disposal District (LSWDD) requires dependable, recurring support from several sources, including garbage disposal fees, sale of recyclables, volunteer hours, and our annual levy. Historically, the levy has generated one-third or less of LSWDD's annual expenses. Without the funds provided by the Levy, LSWDD would be in financial distress. Washington State authorizes disposal districts to seek levy funding only one year at a time, which means LSWDD must pass a levy each year to secure funding for the following year.

In 2014, shortly after LSWDD was created, a levy of \$105,000 supported approximately 40% of LSWDD's operating expenses. In 2023, that same levy amount covered only 19% of operating expenses. Last year the LSWDD board determined that, in 2025, a levy of \$210,000 would be needed to sustain current services and make essential improvements. The Board is asking that this same amount, \$210,000, be approved for 2026 to continue support for: repair and replacement of aging equipment, ongoing increases in garbage transportation and disposal costs, newly imposed interlocal agreement fees, and sufficient sustainable wages. The proposed levy rate is about \$0.094 per \$1,000 of taxable assessed property value. So, if your property's taxable assessed value is \$600,000, you will contribute about \$56.40 over the entire year to help sustain the Lopez Dump.

Vote YES in November for the LSWDD Levy.

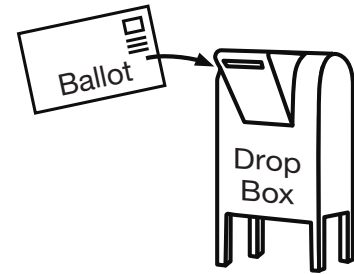

Deposit your ballot in an official drop box by 8 p.m. on Election Day, or return your ballot by mail — postage paid — but make sure it's postmarked by Election Day! Don't let a late postmark disqualify your ballot. The USPS recommends that you mail it back at least one week before Election Day.



Election staff will contact you before your ballot is processed if:

- Your signature is missing
- Your signature doesn't match your voter registration record

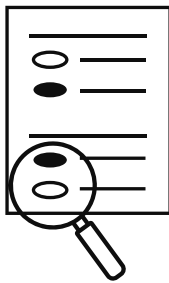
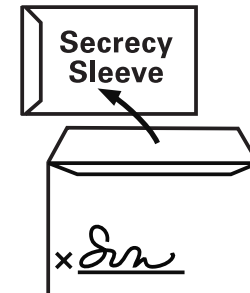
Your signature is verified

Your signature is important and we need it to accept your ballot. The signature on your return envelope is compared to the signature on your voter registration record. If the signature matches, your ballot is accepted and you are credited for voting to ensure **only one** ballot is counted for you.

Envelopes and sleeves are separated

The return envelope is opened and the secrecy sleeve containing your ballot is removed. They are separated to ensure the secrecy of your vote.

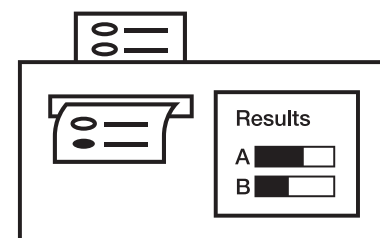
Your ballot is reviewed and scanned

The ballot is removed from the secrecy sleeve and election staff verify that it can be successfully scanned. Each voting system is certified and tested before every election.

Your ballot is counted

After 8 p.m. on Election Day all scanned ballots are tallied. Ballots will be scanned and tallied over the next several days until all the votes are counted. Every county conducts a post-election audit.

Voting systems certification and testing



Ballot counting equipment is tested and certified by an independent testing authority and the State of Washington.

Voting systems are not connected to the internet.

Pre-election audit: logic & accuracy tests

Before every election, counties test their voting systems to make sure the machines are correctly set up and accurately counting votes.

Voter registration database

Washington's statewide voter registration database is constantly maintained and updated as voters become registered, move, change their name, pass away, or are no longer eligible to vote.

All eligible voters are automatically mailed ballots. Only one ballot per voter is accepted.

Paper ballots



Voting on paper ballots allows election officials to audit results of an election after votes are counted.

Signature verification

Trained election officials compare your signature to your voter registration file to confirm your identity and eligibility.

If your signature is missing or doesn't match, your ballot is "Challenged" and you are notified. Once your signature is verified, your ballot status will update to "Accepted".

VoteWA

Check the status of your ballot at VoteWA.gov. Once your ballot status is updated to "Accepted," your ballot will be opened and scanned. Only one ballot per voter is accepted.

Chain of custody

Ballots are sealed in secure, tamper-evident containers and at least two staff are present whenever your ballot is handled.

Scanning and tabulation

Ballot scanners and vote counting machines are physically secured in locked rooms. Election staff sign in and out each time the room is opened, and always in groups of two or more.

After an Election

Random batch audits



Your local election officials hand count randomly selected precincts or ballot batches and compare those numbers to the voting system totals to make sure the vote counting machines counted correctly.

Random ballot audits

Your local election officials examine a statistically significant, randomly selected sample of ballots to help ensure the reported outcome is correct.

Full ballot reconciliation

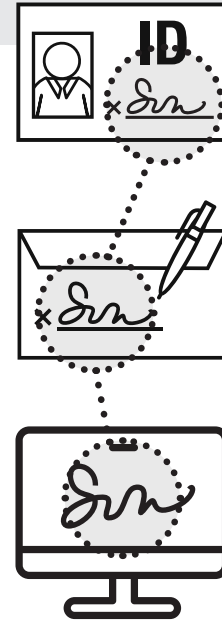
Your local election officials keep detailed records of the steps taken to process each ballot or group of ballots, creating an audit trail.

A final report at the end of the process includes a summary of the ballots received and counted.

Why is my signature important?

Your signature is needed to make sure your ballot gets counted.

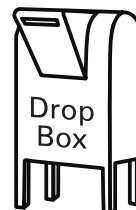
- The signature on your return envelope is compared to the signature on your voter registration record. Trained election officials are responsible for verifying each and every signature.
- If your signature is missing or does not match your voter registration record, the county elections office will contact you by mail **before results are certified**. They may call or email if you gave them this info.
- If you registered to vote online or through Department of Licensing, the signature from your driver's license, permit, or state ID will be on your voter registration record.

What does this mean?

Certification Day

The date when election results are finalized by state or county officials.

Logic and Accuracy Test

A test completed before each election to ensure the accuracy of voting equipment.

Nonpartisan Office

An elected position in which candidates do not state a political party preference and candidates for the office are not officially associated with a political group. Office appears on the ballot as “Nonpartisan.”

Partisan Office

An elected position in which candidates may state their preferred political party. A candidate may also choose “States No Party Preference.” Their preference is printed on the ballot.

Postmark

A postmark indicates the location and date the Postal Service accepted custody of a ballot. Ballots must be postmarked by Election Day to be accepted. Placing your ballot in a mailbox on Election Day does not guarantee a postmark of the same day.

Post-election Audit

A test completed before the certification of results to ensure the security and accuracy of the voting system. Counties perform a post-election audit each election.

Term Type

How much of a term a candidate will be serving for an office. It is split into regular, unexpired, and short-and-full.

Voter Registration Database

The official list of registered voters maintained in every state to conduct safe and secure elections. Our database in Washington is known as VoteWA.

Voting Center

A county-run facility where you can receive voting assistance from trained elections staff. Some services include registering or updating voter information, requesting and returning a ballot, or finding an accessible voting unit.

Voting System

Ballot counting equipment that must be tested by an independent testing authority and certified by the state of Washington before it can be used.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 8201

BE IT RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON, IN LEGISLATIVE SESSION ASSEMBLED:

THAT, At the next general election to be held in this state the secretary of state shall submit to the qualified voters of the state for their approval and ratification, or rejection, an amendment to Article XXIX, section 1 of the Constitution of the state of Washington to read as follows:

Article XXIX, section 1. Notwithstanding the provisions of sections 5, and 7 of Article VIII and section 9 of Article XII or any other section or article of the Constitution of the state of Washington, the moneys of any public pension or retirement fund, industrial insurance trust fund, ~~((or))~~ fund held in trust for the benefit of persons with developmental disabilities, or fund to provide for long-term care services and supports for eligible seniors and

people with disabilities may be invested as authorized by law. Investment income from a fund to provide for long-term care services and supports for eligible seniors and people with disabilities is dedicated to long-term services and supports for program beneficiaries.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this amendment is a single amendment within the meaning of Article XXIII, section 1 of the state Constitution.

The legislature finds that the changes contained in this amendment constitute a single integrated plan for the fund to provide long-term care services and supports for eligible seniors and people with disabilities. If this amendment is held to be separate amendments, this joint resolution is void in its entirety and is of no further force and effect.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the legislature, pursuant to its authority under RCW 29A.36.020(3), specifies the ballot title and concise description shall read "The legislature has proposed a constitutional amendment on allowing money in Washington's long-term care fund to be invested. This amendment would allow the state fund dedicated to providing long-term care benefits for eligible seniors and people with disabilities to be invested as authorized by law.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the secretary of state shall cause notice of this constitutional amendment to be published at least four times during the four weeks next preceding the election in every legal newspaper in the state.

To become a Protected Records Voter:

- You meet with a Certified Advocate who can assist with threat assessment, safety planning, and the program application.
- The best time to enroll is when you move or are planning to move to a location that is unknown to the offender and undocumented in public record.

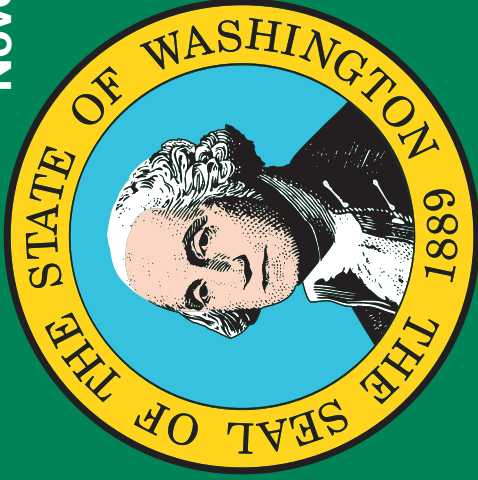
